# **Commonly Ordered CT Procedures And Their Indications**

The procedures and indications below are guidelines for commonly ordered CT procedures. If you have any questions in regards to ordering or scheduling a CT procedure, please feel free to contact the CT Scan Department at 742–2674 option #3 or a Radiologist at 740–2692.

## **Brain CT WITHOUT Contrast**

Indications include:

- CVA
- Stroke
- Acute Trauma
- Shunt Function
- Sudden onset of new headache
- TIA
- Vertigo/Dizziness

## **Brain CT WITH Contrast**

Indications include:

## **Brain CT WITHOUT & WITH Contrast**

Indications include:

- Follow up of known tumor
- Headaches
- Metastasis

## **Pituitary CT Scan**

Indications include:

- MRI W/WO is the preferred exam for Pituitary disorders.
- If the patient cannot tolerate an MRI, and a CT Scan must be done, order the CT Scan study WITH CONTRAST only.

## Mastoids/IAC's WITHOUT Contrast

Indications include:

- Evaluation of middle ear ossicles
- Mastoids
- MRI W/WO is the preferred exam for an acoustic neuroma.
- If the patient cannot tolerate an MRI, and a CT Scan must be done, order the CT Scan study

## Neck CT Scans

Indications include:

- Soft tissue masses such as in the larynx, trachea, and blood vessels in the neck.
- Routine neck CT scans are done WITH CONTRAST.
- Salivary gland stone is W/O & W contrast
- Parathyroid scan W/O & W

## **Chest CT Scan WITH Contrast**

Indications include:

- Masses, evaluation of nodules, cancer or metastatic disease
- Obstructive processes
- Pulmonary Embolism or dissection (see CTA Chest)

## **Chest CT Scan WITHOUT Contrast**

Indications include:

- Pulmonary fibrosis or interstitial lung disease (This is also referred to as a High Resolution Chest Study)
- Follow up of known nodules if no previous mediastinal findings

## **CT ORDERING CHEAT SHEET**

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#### **Abdominal CT Scan**

Note: In CT, an Abdomen scan is only performed from the top of the liver to the bifurcation of the abdominal aorta, which is at the level of the iliac crest. Anything concerning small or large intestine, vascular system, or urinary tract should be ordered as an Abdomen/Pelvis CT.

#### **Pelvis CT Scan**

*Note: In CT, a Pelvis scan starts at the iliac crest and goes through the symphysis pubis.* 

## Abdominal/Pelvis/WITH Contrast

Note: Should be ordered for any patient with RLQ or LLQ pain, any question of appendicitis, diverticulitis, or any type of colon cancer, ileus, inflammatory bowel disease, abscess, and Crohn's disease. An Abdomen/Pelvis should be ordered for any exam in which there are questions of any intestinal involvement

## Abdominal/Pelvis/WITHOUT Contrast

Indications include:

- If you are looking for a Kidney Stone Study, you must order as a "Kidney Stone Study"
- Retroperitoneal bleed
- High creatinine or severe contrast allergy precluding premedication

#### Abdominal CT Scan WITH and WITHOUT Contrast Indications include:

- Adrenal lesions
- Kidney lesions, hematuria protocol
- Liver lesions

## Spine CT Scans

#### Indications include:

Note: CT and MRI have different uses for examining the spine; CT best evaluates the bony cortex while MRI evaluates the narrow cord, discs, and ligaments.

- Thoracic spine CT Scans vertebrae levels must be specified on the physician's order for a CT scan.
- Trauma

# Extremity CT Scans

Indications include:

- Generally ordered WITHOUT Contrast
- Coronal and sagittal reformats are included with all extremity work
- Please indicate if 3D reconstructions are needed (usually only needed for preoperative planning)

## **CTA Chest WITH and WITHOUT Contrast**

• For Pulmonary Embolism (PE) Study or thoracic aortic dissection.

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
